BY CAR



- Take the Helensvale North exit (Exit 60) - Movie World exit off the M1;
- Turn left at the traffic lights (a Caltex service station will be on your left hand side);

Common Problems

S/C 204 Sponsorship limitations

Assistance from a highly qualified migration agent may be necessary if you entered Australia as a holder of a Woman at Risk visa subclass 204. This is because you may have sponsorship limitations and be precluded from sponsoring your partner for a number of years.

The law and policy relating to sponsorship limitations, especially for visa subclass 204, is very complex. Just Migration is experienced in this area and can help you.

Inconsistency of Information

Many refugee migrants may have provided the DIBP with inaccurate information when they applied for their own visa. Subsequently, when they try to apply for a visa for their family or loved one, this previously provided inaccurate information may have significant adverse implications.

We do Freedom of Information (FOI) applications as standard practice. Just Migration reviews the information that was previously provided to the DIBP, making sure that the information you are providing is consistent with what the DIBP already knows about you. If it is not, we help you explain why and set the record straight.

Falsified Documents and Misleading Information

Obtaining evidentiary documents from your home country may be challenging. Knowingly or inadvertently submitting falsified documents or providing misleading information can result in your family and loved ones facing severe consequences that go well beyond mere visa refusal. They could have a grant bar placed on them under the Public Interest Criterion 4020 (PIC 4020).
